That's the FJs signature "knochensack" ("bonesack"). It was designed to be worn over the uniform to stop things snagging during jumps. It was basically an overall, but with short legs:


They'd normally be worn with the trousers underneath, but there are some photos like this that suggest that in hot weather they sometimes weren't:

The FJ jumped into Crete in the same uniforms they'd worn in Norway. These proved a bit hot so after the first day, many took to adopting the 'baby gro' look as seen in the pictures above. There are quite a few pictures of camouflage pattern ones in Nasse's *Fallschrimjager in Crete*. Interestingly, whether wearing camouflaged smocks or plain, most seem to have worn plain helmet covers. The camouflage smocks don't seem to have been dedicated to a particular unit. Men from I./FJR1, 2/Fallsch. San. 7, 13./LL-Sturm-Rgt are all shown with camouflage smocks alongside comrades in plain ones.

As for their TO&E on Crete, it's well detailed in the excellent *The German Fallschirmtruppe 1936-41*. *Its Genesis and Employment in the First Campaigns of the Wehrmacht* by Golla.

Glider troops had ten men per glider and on Crete what was probably a disproportionate number of SLs (not as many as one per glider but most gliders had either an officer or high ranking NCO aboard). Gliders had little room for gear and so the ten men had a MG34 and 4-5 SMGs between them. The gliders were specifically equipped for a rapid *coup de main* at the Heraklion airfield, hence the large number of automatics. Many glider troops armed themselves with rifles in the days after landing.

Parachuting troops in their squads of 12 had two MG34s per squad and 4 SMGs per squad. Some men jumped with SMGs but not all men equipped with one chose to do so.

Obviously, most parachuting squads went into action not only well under strength due to the scattered drop and landing under fire, but without full equipment as so many drop canisters were lost or fell into enemy hands.

Everyone jumped with a pistol and grenades. MGs and rifles were always in canisters. SMGs could be in canisters but many men elected to jump with them (probably from previous experience)

We did some Crete games using these rosters that include drop and glider rules (which I'd simplify a bit in light of the 40 Handbook, but they worked pretty well). I'd consider not making the paras elite - but on the other hand in our games they weren't overpowered due to lack of gear and scattering and losses in the drops.
