Late War Romanians (Rumania 1944+)

Following the losses of 1941, the structure of the Romanian Infantry Platoon was altered to align more closely with those of their German allies, putting more of the focus onto firepower, rather than manpower.

Submachineguns were more prevalent and the Romanians had begun their own weapons development programmes to address the deficiencies in their armaments.

In August 1944 a successful coup led to Romania declaring war on Germany and joining the allies. Romania ended the war fighting alongside the Soviets in Transylvania, Hungary, Austria, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia.

THE INFANTRY PLATOON

A Regular force could represent troops from the Mountain or Cavalry brigades, whereas a Green force might be reservists or a division still integrating new replacements.

ROMANIAN NATIONAL CHARACTERISTICS

ROMANIA MARE

The concept of România Mare, Greater Romania, was a nation building ideology concerning the unification of Romanian speakers, including those in Transylvania, Bukovina and Bessarabia amongst others. When fighting in any of these regions the Romanians will add +2 to their Force Morale roll. When outside these areas they were less enthusiastic and will apply a -2 to the roll.

LEAD BY EXAMPLE

With a predominantly peasant soldiery and a small middle class from which to draw their junior officers, the Romanians were hide-bound by their lack of leadership and initiative within their corps of NCOs. To a degree this was a product of a long-term military relationship with France where the system was dominated by an over-reliance on the junior officers making tactical decisions. To reflect this doctrinal embracement of the importance of central command, the Romanian Sergent Major is rated as a *Junior Leader*, although he is able to influence any troops within the Platoon.

SUPPORT OPTIONS

60MM MORTAR TEAM

The 60mm Brandt mortar has both smoke and H.E. rounds. It has a minimum range of 24" and no maximum range limit. At shorter ranges the crew can use their rifles.

ANTI-TANK TEAM

This consists of two men, the first armed with a pistol and satchel charge, the second with an SMG. They will operate as a Tank Hunter Team. See Section 9.3.4, *Tank Hunters*.

MOLOTOV COCKTAILS

In the absence of any proper anti-tank weapons, the Romanians relied on providing their own impromptu weapons for this task. If selected these should be allocated to specific sections before the game begins.

SATCHEL CHARGE

The satchel charge is shown on Table Seven, *Hand-Held Anti-Tank Weapons*. The charge may be used once by any *Squad* on the table when commanded by the *Senior Leader* commanding the platoon who is, we assume, carrying it with him up to that point. See Section 9.3.4 *Tank Hunters* for usage. A maximum of two satchel charges may be selected by a Romanian force.
